Introduction

In spring of 1925, six Mennonite families arrived on Pelee Island, namely two Dick families, the Thiessens, the Driedgers and two Wiebe families. Their ancestors had come from Holland.

Background

Following excerpt from <u>Mennonites in Early Modern Poland and Prussia</u>, Peter J. Klassen, 2009. Because of religious persecution they moved from Holland to Poland where they lived for two hundred and fifty years. In the latter part of the eighteenth century, Poland was divided among Russia, Prussia and Austria. Most of the areas where the Mennonites now lived came under Prussian rule. When life became difficult there, they moved to Russia/Ukraine.

When the Mennonite people in Ukraine were persecuted, some had the opportunity to come to Canada. And so it was that a group of these people came from Ukraine in 1924 and spent the fall and winter months in the Kitchener-Waterloo area of Ontario, Canada. Here they were lovingly hosted by the Old Order and Amish families.

The six families, named above, share-cropped the Pelee Island farms owned by George O. Cruikshank, an American from Ohio, USA. The first worship services took place in private homes where Rev. Johann Franz Dick, a young man who had been ordained in Ukraine, was pastor. Gerhard Thiessen led the choir consisting of 8-10 young people. The adults sat on benches and chairs, and the children sat on the floor. The families walked to worship services or travelled there by horse and wagon.

These Mennonite islanders were soon joined by Mennonite families and individuals from other parts of Canada. The Pelee congregation peaked at eighteen families in 1928. This number gradually dropped, and by 1949, all but three families had moved to the mainland.

Three Mennonite families purchased Island farms, namely Peter and Maria Fast, Ewald and Elizabeth Wiebe and John and Sigrid Wiebe. George Wiens and Nick and Agnes Wiens purchased homes at the North End.





Katharina Friesen 1926 - 1926

Pelee Island's first Mennonite funeral. Tina was born in New Hamburg, Ontario. She was the daughter of Gerhard and Maria Schmidt Friesen and died on Pelee of Dysentery (*Gelbe Ruhr*) at the age of four months. Her little white coffin was purchased at the McCormick store on Pelee.








Maria Driedger 1930 - 1931 Daughter of Jacob N. and Maria, died at the age of five months.




Wilhelm Schroeder 1904 - 1931

Son of Heinrich and Maria Dirksen Schroeder. He was one of twelve siblings orphaned in Russia. When Wilhelm's appendix ruptured, Ewald Wiebe accompanied him on a special trip to Leamington hospital. Wilhelm died there the following day.

John Heinrichs 1916 - 1938 Son of Jacob and Anna




Maria Fast 1898 -1939 Wife of Peter B. Fast, born in Ukraine, died at the age of 41 years.



1925 - 1950 Mennonite Pastors on Pelee Island



1925-1932

Bishop Jacob H. Janzen and Mrs. Janzen. Bishop Janzen organized the Russian Mennonite immigrants into congregations, including the Pelee group, following their arrival in Ontario. The English language term Bishop was used in place of the German term *Aeltester*.



1925-1950 The Mission Hall

George Pegg was a lay Pastor, school teacher and township treasurer. The Pegg's invited the Mennonite immigrants to use their Mission Hall free of charge; Mennonite weddings and larger events were held there. Many Mennonite men were smokers; Mr. Pegg objected to their habit of lighting up after church.



1925-1928

Rev. Johann F. & Katharina Dick. Rev. Dick was the Pelee Mennonite's first pastor.


















